

Public finance report – MXN\$119.7bn deficit in the PSBRs at the end of August

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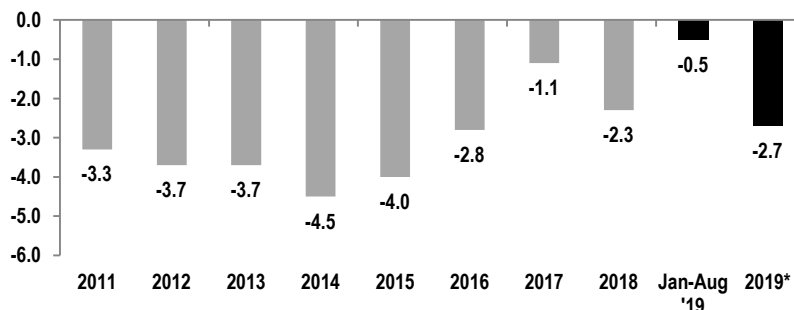
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- The Ministry of Finance (MoF) released its public finances report for the eighth month of 2019
- Public sector borrowing requirements (Jan-Aug): MXN\$119.7bn deficit (~US\$6.0bn)
- Public balance (Jan-Aug): MXN\$118.1bn deficit (~US\$5.9bn)
- Primary balance (Jan-Aug): MXN\$279.8bn surplus (~US\$14.0bn)
- Budget revenues decreased 2.1% yoy in real terms, impacted by a strong contraction in oil-related income (-19.7% yoy)
- Budget expenses edged-down 4.0% yoy in real terms, coming in MXN\$232.1bn below estimates
- In this respect, the primary surplus is even higher than expected, mainly because of lower spending
- The Historic Balance of the Public Sector Borrowing Requirements stood at MXN\$10.8 trillion (~US\$537.5bn), equivalent to 43.3% of GDP

MXN\$119.7bn deficit in the PSBRs in the first eight months of 2019. The Ministry of Finance released its public finance report for August, in which we highlight the MXN\$119.7bn deficit in *Public Sector Borrowing Requirements* (PSBR) –the broadest measure of the public balance¹–, equivalent to 0.5% of GDP. This was considerably higher than the MXN\$269.9bn deficit during the same period of 2018. In addition, the “traditional” public balance posted a MXN\$118.1bn deficit, lower than the MXN\$311.3bn budgeted deficit. In this regard, spending cuts have more than compensated for a relative slowdown in income, driving the better-than-estimated result for the period. Excluding investments in projects of high economic and social impact –such as those in Pemex and CFE of up to 2% of GDP– the balance showed a MXN\$132.8bn surplus. In addition, the primary surplus stood at MXN\$279.8bn, above the MXN\$150.3bn budgeted surplus.

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¹ The PSBRs include the sum of the Public Balance, the financial requirements of the Mexican Bank Savings Protection Institute, financial requirements of deferred investment projects, adjustments to budget records, financial requirements of the National Infrastructure Funds, program of debtors and the expected gain or loss of development banks and development funds.

Total revenues were down 2.1% yoy, impacted by lower oil-related income.

According to the MoF, revenues were MXN\$3,479.9bn, which was MXN\$89.1bn lower than projected. This was mainly due to the sharp contraction in oil revenues, down 19.7% yoy, amounting only to MXN\$546.2 bn. This fall is explained by the 9.9% contraction in oil production coupled with the 4.4% decline in the Mexican oil mix price.

Non-oil tax collections increased 2.5% yoy in real terms, amounting to

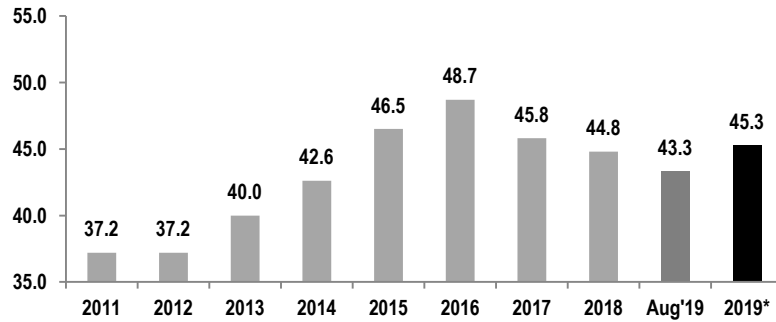
MXN\$2,202.6bn, MXN\$52.1bn below budget. We highlight the 0.4% contraction on income tax collection as well as the 2.9% fall in VAT revenues. On the other hand, excise taxes (IEPS) grew 32.8% while import taxes increased 2.9%. Finally, Hydrocarbon E&P tax revenues grew 18.8% yoy. Non-oil, non-tax revenues stood at MXN\$184.7bn, which implies an 8.3% decrease in real terms. Additionally, government-controlled entities (IMSS and ISSSTE) were up 2.3%, while CFE rose 7.5%.

Budget spending edged-down 4.0%, reaching MXN\$3,648.6bn.

This was MXN\$232.1bn below budget. Primary spending –which does not include debt financing costs–, fell 5.1% yoy while financing costs were up 4.9%. Programmable spending was down 4.6%, amounting to MXN\$2,589.7bn. The main increases in this branch were in ISSSTE (+7.0%) and IMSS (+4.7%). Nevertheless, spending by administrative branches fell a hefty 8.8%, which we believe was driven by austerity measures implemented by the Federal Government. Spending in autonomous branches decreased 17.6%. Moreover, non-programmable spending excluding the financial cost of debt decreased 7.2%, stemming from the 86.9% reduction in ADEFAS, while Participations – transfers to states under the federal tax collection agreement– increased 2.5%.

The Historic Balance of Public Sector Borrowing Requirements (HBPSBR) stood at MXN\$10.8tn (~US\$537.5bn), equivalent to 43.3% of GDP. Moreover, net public-sector debt amounted to MXN\$11.1n (~US\$554.6bn). Net domestic debt reached MXN\$7.0tn, while net foreign debt climbed to US\$203.3 billion (equivalent to MXN\$4.1tn).

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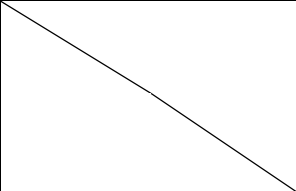
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
